

HELPFUL INFOMATION

Just a few words to get you oriented as the 1977 General Assembly begins.

- Transit The buses within the city and surrounding boroughs operate on an exact fare basis. The cost of a bus trip is 50¢ cash or a TTC ticket or token. Bus drivers do not carry change. Tickets or tokens can make the fare cheaper if you intend on making more than four bus trips, or if your party consists of a number of people that is collectively making more than four trips. Tickets or tokens can be purchased five for \$2.00 (as opposed to \$2.50 for five cash fares) in the subway stations or at stores displaying the 'exact fare' sign.
 - Bus trips that involve using more than one bus to reach a destination may or may not require the use of a transfer slip. Whatever the case may be, get one anyway. It may save you the cost of an extra, unnecessary fare. On buses ask the driver for the transfer; on the subway get one from the machine as you enter.
 - If you plan on using the subway past 9:40 pm please note that the Museum subway station is closed at that time. Delegates arriving at the Margaret Addison Residence past this time must use either St. George or Bay stations. The entrances to these stations are indicated on the accompanying map.
 - Toronto Transit Commision buses do not run up to Richmond Hill, the site of the David Dunlap Observatory. The organizing Committee has arranged for transportation on Saturday. Buses will leave the McLaughlin Planetarium for the dinner there at 6:30 pm.
- Parking If you are one of those who has driven into town there are several pay parking lots in the vincinity of the Residence and the Planetarium. The cost of parking varies from lot to lot. There is legal parking next to parking meters without cost on Sundays. The location of several of these lots is also shown on the map.

PLACES OF INTEREST

- 1) CNE Stadium Major League Baseball. The Toronto Blue Jays are playing everyday throughout the long weekend.
- 2) Ontario Place On the waterfront, free concerts in the 'Forum', Cinesphere: a giant geodesic dome with a huge screen where 'Silent Sky' is showing...a unique glider flight on film. Great family fun.
- 3) The Eaton Centre A must for the entire family.
- 4) CN Tower- Canada and the world's tallest free standing structure. Two observation decks and a fantastic view:
- Toronto Island A short distance from Ontario Place.

 This weekend the 'International Picnic' is being held there. Acres and acres of park land, an amusement park, canoe and bicycle rentals. Catch Island Ferry at Harbour Castle Hotel.
- 6) Royal Ontario Museum One of the finest museums in the country. You will have no difficulty finding this place; across the road from Margaret Addison and next to the Planetarium
- 7) Ontario Science Centre Even if your family is not attending the dinner, the Science Centre makes fascinating sight-seeing.
- 8) City Hall Located in the downtown of Toronto. Heralded the world over for it's unique architecture and public square.
- 9) Commerce Court Observation deck, second largest biewing gallery in Toronto; not as large as the CN Tower but a little cheaper and still a fantastic view.
- 10) Toronto Zoo -
- 11) Casa Loma Canada's only 'castle'.

We suggest you pick up a copy of the Toronto Star, Globe and Mail or Toronto Sun for more specific information about these places and a more extensive list of places to go and things to see.


Eating Establishments

Below is a condensed list of eating places within a ten minute walking radius of the Margaret Addison Residence. While it is by no means complete, it provides enough variety that the average person will be able to get along well if he wants to eat fancy or wants to eat a hamburger.

- (2) Pizza Patio...good pizzas
- (3) Frank's Pizza...very good pizzas
- (4) Murray's...traditional restaurant, highly rated by members of the Toronto Centre who have spent many an evening there after a meeting. Breakfast is served and it is the closest to the Margaret Addison Residence.
- (5) R.O.M. Cafeteria...
- (6) The Groaning Board...mainly vegetarian but very unusual and interesting. Prices are not expensive. We suggest you try their food!
- (7) Toby's...the more expensive hamburgers
- (8) Pepper Mill...excellent, but don't count on breakfast
- (9) Spice of Life...mexican vegetarian food
- (10) Cafe de la Paix, Collonade...good food and a good place to see Bloor st. if you eat on the terrace
- (11) McDonald's...come now...
- (12) Kentucky Fried Chicken...need we say more?
- (13) Swiss Chalet...good chicken, full course meals
- (14) Chinese Jade...Oriental food
- (15) Jack and Jill, Collonade...much like Murray's.
- (16) Hyatt Regency, Hyatt Grill...Formal eating place, expensive, excellent food. Highly recommended.
